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COVID-19 UPDATE

Effective Aug. 14, Durham Region Health Department has begun winding down local COVID-19 vaccine mass immunization clinics, giving community members a few more weeks to get their first or second dose at one of these clinics.

Walk-in opportunities for either first or second doses continue to be available at all mass immunization clinics for anyone 12 and older. People are also still able to book appointments at

durham.ca/vaccineappointment or call 1.888.444.5113.

Individuals who have an appointment booked at a mass immunization clinic after the date that the clinic closes will be contacted by phone or email about where they can receive their vaccination.

"Local mass immunization clinics are no longer filling up, signalling the need to phase out large scale clinics," explained Dr. Robert Kyle, Durham Region Medical Officer of Health. "As the need for large mass immunization clinics comes to an end, there will still be many opportunities for residents to get vaccinated."

Health Department vaccine clinics are being planned on a smaller scale to be available in the community for those waiting or unable to access mass immunization clinics. These additional clinics will be posted at **durham.ca/covidvaccines**

Claremont Library

This fall, a new pilot project will launch at the Claremont Library to provide Extended Access to residents of north Pickering.



The Extended Access project will add 50 hours of service weekly to the Claremont Library through new self-serve technology. This technology includes 1) a library card scanner that will give you access to the Library and 2) self-checkout machines. During Extended Access hours, you will be able to borrow materials, study, use the computers or WIFI, print and photocopy, and connect remotely to the staff at the Central Library.

This innovative service will improve library service to north Pickering, matching the hours of other Pickering Public Library locations. Please stay tuned to Pickering Public Library's website for updates on the launch and sign up to be one of the first to test the new service.
