New Election Day October 25, 2010
As a result of recent changes to the Municipal Elections Act, the 2010 municipal election will be held on October 25th.

Apart from the day to day business of running the City, Councillors have the opportunity to bring forward special matters to Council for consideration through a Notice of Motion. Ward 3 City Councillor Pickles recently initiated and Council approved his following Notices of Motion:

Direct Election of the Durham Regional Chair - In the 2006 municipal election, 89 per cent of Pickering residents voted in favour of direct election in a referendum. Council approved a motion brought forward by Ward 3 City

Councillor David Pickles that Pickering Council officially ratify the results of the referendum and request the Province to enact a regulation requiring the direct election of the regional chair. "Tonight the passing of my motion made it formal and official Pickering supports the election of the Regional Chair," Councillor Pickles said after the meeting.

Attracting More Investment to the City - The city is working to create jobs and attract new business and bring business taxes into the city, Councillor Pickles introduced a motion at Council calling for staff to create a development incentive program that will attract more business, jobs and sustainable elements to building in Pickering. "We need to look at possible City initiatives, without giving up any dollars the city would normally receive." Payments such as development charges, building permit fees and payments in lieu of parkland are usually substantial when it comes to large projects. That payment is currently required up-front and may act as a deterrent to projects getting underway. The plan is to still charge the same total amount of fees payable to the City, but to accept them through phased-in payment. "To help attract more business, more jobs and lessen taxes on residents," Councillor Pickles said.

Request for a Regional Integrity Commissioner - Ward 3 City Councillor David Pickles introduced a motion at Pickering Council asking the Region of Durham to hire an integrity commissioner to serve Durham and all of its municipalities. The idea is to get an integrity commissioner in place to work across the region on a common code of conduct for elected officials and to hear complaints. Pickering Council approved the motion unanimously. Hiring a shared integrity commissioner to handle complaints across Durham Region would allow for consistent rules, application and cost savings. Each municipality would be billed separately for the amount of service required, which hopefully would be very seldom.

Revamping of Municipal Election Finances - Pickering Ward 3 City Councillor David Pickles introduced a motion requesting the Province to undertake a review of the Municipal Elections Act to ensure rules regarding election expenses and financing are appropriate and transparent across all municipalities. It was passed unanimously by Council. He was glad to hear that the province adopted in legislation some of the changes discussed at Pickering Council and elsewhere. Changes included moving election day up by two weeks to the fourth Monday in October (the 25th this year); barring councillors from using campaign fund raising surpluses in future elections; requiring councils to appoint compliance and audit committees to oversee any public complaints about campaign violations; raising penalties for violating the Elections Act to; and closing loopholes in fund raising rules. "I'm pleased," he said after hearing the news. "I think a number of things they're looking at are going to help level the playing field."

Full Sidewalks the Entire Length of Pickering's Kingston Road

Pickering residents should be able to walk along Kingston Road comfortably and safely, from Toronto to Ajax. At present there are sections where there is no sidewalk - mothers pushing strollers, cyclists walking bikes, residents with mobility issues using wheelchairs and people of all ages from seniors to youth walk along the unpaved shoulder on Pickering's main street, Kingston Road. Council supported Ward 3 City Councillor David Pickles' motion that Pickering develop a plan to complete sidewalks, on both the south and north sides, making the entire road accessible for pedestrians throughout Pickering. Councillor Pickles said the City has waited long enough for the sidewalks to be improved along the regional road.

Updates from 2009 Newsletter

Sustainable Pickering - As a founding member of the Sustainable Pickering Advisory Committee I am very proud of the progress the city and its residents are making to reduce our environmental impact. Visit www.davidpickles.com for an update on Measuring Sustainable Report and other matters.



Claremont Fire Station Update - Further to my item in the last newsletter, now that there are full time fire fighters in Claremont, and some other improvements, Pickering will have a Fire Underwriters Survey completed this fall. We are hopeful that this will result in lower insurance rates in the area, be sure to check with your home insurer next time you renew you policy.

Pickering Reaches Settlement on York-Durham Sewer System - Although I am frustrated and also disappointed by the Minister of the Environment's approval of this project, as the legal proceedings unfolded, the City received a broad range of legal opinions indicating that it would find itself on the losing end of a costly legal battle. In 2009, the City initiated legal action against York Region over the twinning of the SEC and the location of its related odour control facility. Subsequently correspondence was received from the Minister of the Environment, which effectively approved the SEC, while essentially quashing the City's hopes of stopping the project. The City of Pickering and York Region have signed off on the Minutes of Settlement with respect to the Southeast Collector Trunk Sanitary Sewer (SEC) and Duffin Creek Water Pollution Control Plant. In addition to the possibility of footing a multi-million dollar legal bill, the City of Pickering risked having York Region rescind its original agreement to fund a number of key community enhancements. It became evident that the City needed to settle with York Region to not only avoid a crippling legal outcome, but also renegotiate community benefits, environmental controls and safety commitments while it still had any leverage.

North Pickering Updates

Many residents are not aware that over 60% of Pickering is protected "green" either through the Greenbelt or many valleys and parks.

Federal Lands/Airport - As you know I have long opposed an airport. The good news is there is no news of an airport, or no news on the business case being released. I do remain concerned and lobby against the abandonment and demolition of homes on the federal lands.

Seaton - Plans for the development of Seaton are proceeding slowly. This is not bad as I want to ensure that good planning, design, and sustainable development and environmental protection occurs. As well, it is important that we stand firm on a "jobs first" approach to maximize local jobs and business taxes to help off-set residential taxes.

Northeast Pickering - I am working with residents of Greenwood to try to resolve concerns with the 407 extension and the Westney Road by-pass. Durham Region and the province are working to address future land use and timing in the area through the official plan. I am also hopeful that there will shortly be a significant land conservation announcement near Greenwood - stay tuned!
